Message From Our President

Greetings to the Bull Dog Nation:

On April 20 a committee of your Bull Dog Alumni Association will meet to evaluate several current grant proposals received by the Association in the last several weeks from Bull Dog teachers. The grant proposals reflect a range of important activities conducted at Columbus North High School, all with the express purpose of creating educational excellence for Bull Dog students.

The Grants Committee would not be able to engage in such a review and conduct without the generous contributions of the Bull Dog Nation. Year 2016 was a very good year for raising funds for the Bull Dog Alumni Association. The number of donations was up 68 percent from 2015, and \$19,797.07 was raised – up 50 percent from 2015. The leading donor classes are 1967 with 22 donors and 1972 with 12 donors – 1957, 1966, 1964, 1968, and 1986 were close behind. All this reflects the growing generosity and understanding of members of the Bull Dog National for the important work the Alumni Association is able to perform.

The Bull Dog Alumni Association looks forward to the summertime and our participation in several class reunion events.

“OUR BIG MOVE”

This year marks the 60 years since my class moved from the 7th street campus to the one here on 25th street. This makes our class the first to graduate from this location

Although our 55/56 and 56/57 football years were played here on the Maple street field, our biggest enjoyment was not having to walk to the 8th street field for practice, and then coming back to dark locker rooms of the old Pearl Street Gym (now gone along with the 7th street school building).


We left creaking wooden floors and steep stairways to come to a modern facility with long wide hallways and terrazzo floors. It was even a greater treat to have a parking lot and not have to look for a place to park on the street. Classrooms with a lot of natural light made learning a more enjoyable process.

The Maple street gym was a better place to play basketball in that you could drive to the basket without running into a wall or running down the stairs and out the door as happened in the Pearl street


gym. Not only that but the fact we were playing to much larger bleachers filled with cheering fans than ever existed at the Pearl street gym.

Yes, we actually ate cafeteria food, since the only food establishment in the area was the root beer stand since no other eating establishments had caught up with the new school.

My very own first classes began after my first semester of student teaching second semester of 1952. However, when Mr. Erne learned that I had taken book binding classes when I worked at Bartholomew County Library, he had me binding books in the high school library. I was teaching classes, too, but he finally gave me a full schedule of my own.

I don't remember exactly when we learned that we were moving to a brand new high school on 25th Street. There was an elementary school on the corner of 25th and Maple Streets. They were to remain there until another elementary school was finished. We were told a year in advance of our move that we were to pack all of our books and equipment in cardboard boxes and mark them as to what was in each box with our names on top along with the number of the room to which we were assigned. I was told that my room would be 130, the first room west of the elementary school and directly across from the main office. There was a full page picture in The Log of Mr. Erne and me standing by a huge pile of dirt in front of the new entrance.



He joked that he had put me there because he wanted to keep an eye on me! And he did! Frequently, he wandered into one of my classes and talked to the students about something he had on his mind. He never told me in advance nor did he tell me what he would be talking about – I doubt that he knew – until the notion hit him. You know Mr. Erne. He loved to talk to kids and I know that he missed being in the classroom. Sometimes it was alright, but other times it surely wrecked my plans.

Having the little kids walking among the big kids as they went to and from lunch or moved from one class to another could have dangerous, but Mr. Erne had told our students about how much they would serve as models to the little ones and that they must be careful not to run over them and above all, to be very kind to them. Around Christmas holidays the little ones loved to come caroling, and they especially loved to wear their masks and “trick or treat” us at Halloween. It was fun – another interruption – but fun. I purchased treats so we would have something to give them.

For quite some time workers were underfoot. We lacked some important things such as blackboards, finished floors, painted walls, etc. Gradually we were put together and all of us were so thrilled with the new North High School. Too late we learned that we had too few electrical outlets – we had one in the front and one in the back of the room. That was true until the recent remodeling. Since we had no air-conditioning, the outlets were needed for fans that teachers would bring in when the heat in spring and fall was Unbearable – once it was actually 104 in my room!

When the elementary kids finally left us, we really missed them! It seemed we rattled around in there for quite some time; however, the year before East opened we were so crowded that we had morning schedules and afternoon schedules as well as “up” staircases and “down” staircases. The year before East opened all the seniors wanted to stay at North so they could graduate from



“their” school. I can’t remember how many students we had, but I know I had 24 teachers in the English Department!

North was a very serviceable school. Mr. Erne had determined it would be one of the outstanding schools in the state and it was – in all ways. The janitorial staff kept it shining. Remember our “ding dong” pleasant passing bells? Remember the brightly painted different colored doors to each room? In the basement of the gym there was a Rumpus Room (below) where students could play Ping Pong, dance, play card games or just sit and talk.

This year, for the first time, we had a rumpus room, which was located in the physical ed building. This room offered a place for C. H. S. students to really “cut loose” during their period.

Teachers had a private dining room where we could have great conversations with teachers from other departments. He even had plans for the Home Economics Department to serve us with nice china and silverware. He hired ladies to keep order in the cafeteria and other ladies to take study halls so that teachers could have prep periods and conference periods. He was very ahead of his time! In fact, no one has caught up to him and his great ideas.

This is turning into a Praise Jud Erne article, but he was amazing. He knew that a school couldn’t have an outstanding writing program if teachers didn’t have time to grade and conference with students. He asked Webb Salmon, Chair of the English Department, to ask English teachers to keep track of the hours we spent grading each night, over the weekends and on holidays. We were given strict orders not to pad our times, and we were careful with our numbers of hours. Because of the colossal amount of our grading time, he got the board to allow us to have only four of six classes, with one prep period and one conference period. That was unbelievable! We were able to develop the best writing program in the state. We were fortunate enough to have that schedule from 1954 until 1984! His original plan was to move on to include the Social Studies Department if they agreed to have an intensive writing program, too. He wanted “Writing Across the Curriculum”. Can you imagine the excellence of writing programs across the country if we invested our money into such brilliance instead of the intensive testing messes we have had since “No Child Left Behind”??

If you are wondering about the schedules of high school teachers presently? There is an eight period day and six classes! Because of the short class time many units of literature and writing have been dropped; there is no time for conferencing or mentoring. There is little time for department meetings and sharing or preparing curriculum – continued learning and development together. That kind of program creates collegial, proud professionals and well-prepared students.

"Thank You" to Our Generous Supporters!

Each year, the Bull Dog Alumni Association undertakes a funding campaign. This annual support campaign funds the huge majority of BDAA programs. In particular, it supports faculty and student support programs that cannot be funded in other ways.

During our 2016 campaign, 133 generous Bull Dog alumni donated just less than \$20,000! This total represented over 50% growth from our 2015 campaign. Most importantly, it is allowing your Alumni Association to invest roughly \$18,000 in scholarships and faculty/student support programs in 2017 –more than the total we provided in the entire 2013 -2015 period. Please take note of the Honor Roll of 2016 donors listed separately in this newsletter.

Our programs are assisting faculty and supporting students in a wide range of unfunded, but important, educational activities such as educational field trips, faculty education and professional development, academic competitions, and classroom equipment to facilitate learning. An example of our flexibility is that we were able, on short notice, to contribute to the transportation expenses of the Sound of North marching band that participated in the Presidential Inaugural festivities in Washington, D.C.

As alumni support continues to grow, we hope to begin filling even more of the huge unmet need for faculty development and student support.

During the recently completed 2016 funding campaign, we received generous donations from alumni of dozens of CHS and CNHS classes – from 1947 to 2006. The greatest number of donors came from the classes of the 1960's, followed by the classes of the '70's and '50's. The **class of 1967** had the most donors, followed by the class of 1972. The classes of 1957, 1966, 1964, 1968 and 1986 earned honorable mention in this category. In addition, the classes of 1956 and 1989 made group donations.

Notably, we reached out to family, friends and classmates of Michael Garber during our 2016 campaign. Through their generous donations, the Michael Garber Memorial Fund has become self-sustaining – meaning that it will be able to award a \$500 Michael Garber Scholarship to a deserving Bull Dog every year for the foreseeable future.

WINTER SPORTS WRAP-UP

Bull Dog Boys Basketball – The Bull Dogs boys basketball team finished their season with a 15-9 record after losing in the sectional to Bloomington South. They had what you might call an up-and-down season that included a five-game losing streak but also an eight-game winning streak. Stellar performer and MVP Alex King has made a commitment to continue his basketball career at West Point playing for the U. S. Military Academy.

Bull Dog Girls Basketball – The Bull Dog girls basketball team reached a familiar spot, advancing to the final four in the state tournament for the 3rd straight year. Their bid for a 3rd consecutive appearance in the state championship game fell short

as they lost to Indianapolis Pike 52-49. They finished the season with a 21-8 record.

Maliah Howard-Bass was named the team's MVP and also named to the Indiana Girl's All-Star team (another article included). Additionally, Ashlyn Huffman was named to the Academic All-State team.

Bull Dog Girls Swimming - The girls swimming team finished their dual meet season with a 4-7 record. They sent two individual swims and two relays to the state finals, and finished 26th as a team. Darby Coles was named MVP at the end of the season.

Bull Dog Boys Swimming ended their dual meet season with a 9-4 mark. They were represented in the state meet with two individual swims and three relays. At the yeend awards banquet, sophomore Sam Russell was named MVP.

Bull Dog Wrestling Team finished the season with a 9-20 mark. They were led by senior Josh Larson who compiled a 38-6 record on the year. For his efforts, Larson was named MVP at the season-ending banquet.

The **Bull Dog Girls Gymnastics** finished their dual meet season at 8-0. They were also Conference Indiana champs as well as sectional and regional champs.

They capped their season with a second-place finish where they came up 0.30 points behind state champion Valparaiso. They had TWO individual state champions – **Claire Thompson on the beam** (she was also 3rd on uneven bars and 2nd in all-around) and **Ashley Holliday in the vault** (she was also 7th on bars and 3rd in all-around).

Additionally, senior Ashley Holliday won the prestigious Mildred Ball Mental Attitude Award (see previous article).






